Elephantopus mollis

Elephantopus mollis Kunth

Family: Asteraceae

Description: Tough herb, to 5 ft tall but usually shorter. Leaves 8 inches long by 3 inches wide, alternate, clasping stem, upper surface darker than lower; lower covered with fine hairs, margins slightly scalloped. Flower heads in terminal clusters, bracts triangular, flowers white to pink. Fruit an achene, 1 inch long. Greek: *elephas*, elephant; *pous*, foot; the low-growing plant in rosette stage is said to resemble the footprint of an elephant⁽⁷⁰⁾; *mollis*, with soft hairs⁽⁶⁹⁾.

Distribution: Pantropical origin. Found in mesic to wet areas in pastures, forest roads, and other non-croplands on Kaua'i, O'ahu, Moloka'i, Maui, and Hawai'i. First collection on Kaua'i in 1926⁽⁷⁰⁾.

Environmental impact: Displaces forages in pastures.

Management: *E. spicatus* was sensitive to picloram and dicamba, moderately so to triclopyr and metsulfuron.
