Justicia betonica L.

Family: Acanthaceae

Description: Shrub, 2–7 ft tall with purplish stems. Leaves ovate, opposite, 8 inches long by 5 inches wide, green, lower surface lighter. Flowers in spikes shaped like shrimp, white appearance because of 3 white bracts with green veins covering each of the lavender flowers, blooms year round⁽⁵⁹⁾. Genus named in honor of James Justice, a prominent 16th century Scottish official and gardener⁽⁷⁰⁾; *betonica*, betony, name of a number of herbs⁽⁵⁾.

Distribution: An ornamental originally from tropical Asia, found on Kaua'i, O'ahu, Moloka'i, Lana'i, Maui, and Hawai'i. First collected on Hawai'i in 1943⁽⁷⁰⁾.

Environmental impact: Tolerates shade, forms dense stands in pastures and woodlands.



Management: Probably sensitive to hormone-type herbicides. Controlled by foliar application of low concentration of glyphosate product (Bryon Stevens, DOFAW).
